


- a ABUNDANT: likely to be seen in large numbers in appropriate habitat and season.
- c COMMON: likely to be seen in appropriate habitat and season.
- o OCCASIONAL: not certain to be seen; occurs in small numbers or irregularly.
- r RARE: not seen every year, unexpected as to season or range.
- x ACCIDENTAL: rarely seen, out of range.

Jackson Hole is defined, for the purposes of this checklist, as including the western slope of the Gros Ventre Range, the entire Teton Range, and the valley area south of Yellowstone National Park extending to the confluence of the Snake and Hoback Rivers. The area covered includes all of Grand Teton National Park, the National Elk Refuge, the John D. Rockefeller, Jr. Parkway between Yellowstone and Teton Parks, the eastern portion of the Caribou-Targhee National Forest, and a large portion of the Bridger-Teton National Forest.

Habitats found within this area include: river and stream riparian, lakes and ponds, sage grasslands, mountain-shrub, aspen and coniferous forests, cliffs and talus slopes, alpine tundra, ranches and hayfields, and human settlements. Elevation varies from approximately 6,000 feet to over 13,000 feet.

For your convenience, the calendar year is divided into four seasons. But birds do not recognize our calendar. They respond to instinct, climate, environmental change and food supply. Some individual birds wander out of their predicted range and may be seen only once in decades. Some species are irruptive and, thus, unpredictable year to year. Use this checklist as a guide only; deviations are to be expected and add to the enjoyment and fascination of birdwatching.

As the list indicates, 341 species of birds have been reported. New species surely have been and will be observed. To improve our state records and future checklists, record the species you observe as well as the number seen if possible and *please return the list* to the Wyoming Game & Fish Department, 420 N. Cache, Jackson WY 83001. Do not hesitate to provide us with differing opinions on relative frequency of occurrence or breeding status. A replacement checklist will be provided if requested.
